PALM SUNDAY

APRIL 13, 2025



Holy Week is the most important week in our faith, spanning the final eight days of Jesus' life, from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday. It is astounding how much insight and inspiration are available. Here's a sample:

- Palm Sunday: Jesus triumphantly enters Jerusalem.
- Monday of Holy Week: Jesus clears out the temple with a whip.
- Tuesday of Holy Week: Jesus is anointed with oil at Bethany and preaches on the Mount of Olives.
- Spy Wednesday: Jesus is betrayed by Judas.
- Holy Thursday: Jesus celebrates the Last Supper, prays in the Garden of Gethsemane, and is arrested.
- Good Friday: Jesus is sentenced to death, scourged, beaten, crucified and dies on the cross.
- Holy Saturday: Jesus is buried in the tomb and descends into hell.
- Easter Sunday: Jesus rises from the dead.

We are all trying to make sense of life. One way is to look at each day in the context of Holy Week.

What defines our days? Good Friday is an easy one as it's a day of suffering and sacrifice. Holy Saturday is a day of darkness, doubt, anxiety, confusion and a day where faith is tested. And Easter Sunday? It's a day of new beginnings.

These great moments in the life of the Church and the life of Jesus provide powerful lenses through which we can see our lives in a new way, expanding our understanding of ourselves and others.

31 WEEKS LATER ...

Ironically, it was a group of 12 women who journeyed together for 31 weeks during the course of a year and a half, in search of a closer connection with God.

That's quite a commitment - but perhaps "investment" is the better word. Once the decision was made, they delved into the process without looking back.

Jacqueline Syrup Bergan and Sister Marie Schwan wrote the Take and Receive Series based on the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius for use in a parish setting. Each of their five books -"Love," "Birth," "Forgiveness," "Surrender" and "Freedom" - inspire

about six weeks of daily prayer experiences.

Parishioner Pat Davies, who is also a spiritual director and retreat facilitator, led this weekly faithsharing group, which was open to all parishioners. It began with "Love."

"You can't go to a deeper level without connecting with God's unconditional love," says Pat. "Ultimately, that is where freedom is found."

Because of this investment of time, the women have grown closer to God and to one another. Individually they spent about a half-hour daily reading scriptural passages, commentary and a suggested approach to the day's prayer. On Saturday mornings, they met.

"There were guidelines," Pat says, the most important of which was no cross-talk. "This was not a discussion group; it was a faith-sharing group. ... offering a sacred and safe place for the women to say how they felt and share what was going on. They shared everything."

And that authenticity and vulnerability revealed

eunique perspectives about faith - and built a community along the way.

"St. Paul said, 'Pray without ceasing.' That never made sense to me," says one participant. "Now I understand that it's not about repeating prayers but being in a prayerful state and aware of God's presence. I tune into that presence more quickly and am confident that God is there and I am being heard."

"Because we have shared so much in a safe space during this journey of 31 sessions, we feel like a spiritual sisters," says another. "We've seen a transformation in each member - a deepened understanding of God's love for each of us has enabled us to put greater trust in God. We move forward seeking to discern and follow God's plan for us, understanding now that surrendering to his will is the way to joy and peace no matter what lies ahead."

"Life is challenging. Now I know how to get in touch with that wellspring and find peace in the middle of the chaos."
