TODAY'S READINGS

Reading I: Exodus 16: 2-4, 12-15

Reacting to the people's complaint, Yahweh provides prompt relief by sending the manna and the quail. The manna, for St. John, is a "type" of the Holy Eucharist.

Reading II: Ephesians 4: 17, 20-24

The "old man" for Paul represents the convert's life led only with mere human resources to go by leading to weakness and sin. The new life, "put on" at Baptism, is an actual incorporation into Christ.

The Gospel: John 6: 24-35

Jesus instructs the crowd that has followed Him on the true bread from heaven, which is Christ Himself. This Bread alone gives a person true life.

It seems the closer I come to the poor and broken people of the world, the greater my desire is to speak directly about God, and the less I feel impelled to deal with the burning issues of our day.
