THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

First Reading - <u>Joshua 24:1-2A, 15-17, 18B</u>

Joshua challenges Israel to choose its allegiance at Shechem; the people reaffirm their commitment to the Lord, recalling his deliverance and protection throughout their history.

Second Reading - Ephesians 5:21-32 or 5:2A, 25-32

Christ's love guides marital roles: Wives respecting husbands as the church respects Christ, and husbands loving wives as Christ loves the church, symbolizing unity and sanctity.

Gospel - John 6:60-69

Jesus addresses the difficulty of his teachings and acknowledges disbelief among his followers. After many leave, Peter reaffirms their faith, recognizing Jesus as the Holy One of God.

Focus: Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life.

It can be challenging to be people of faith.

Accepting and understanding the magnitude of the Lord's love for us, including the mystery of Jesus handing himself over for us, may be difficult at times. But faith is a gift, so although we may struggle, we can trust God to grant us the grace we need to commit to serving him and following his Son.

Liturgy of the Word:

In the first reading, Joshua calls upon Israel to commit to serve God above all other gods. In the second reading, Paul uses marital imagery to teach about Christ's love for his Church. In the Gospel, some disciples find Jesus' teaching about the bread of life too difficult to accept. Peter trusts Jesus and commits to continue following him.





known as Food Pantry Sunday, and the shelves are Pantry showing how busy we've been!


By the end of the week, we will have served at leastt 125

people spread among 35 families, including many single seniors.



Right about now folks start to get antsy to get together. Last year, however, scheduling conflicts precluded a favorite way to do so: The Parish Picnic.




