

On August 9, the Catholic Church remembers St. Teresa Benedicta of the Cross (St. Edith), who was born Edith Stein on October 12, 1891 - a date that coincided with her family's celebration of Yom Kippur. Although she stopped believing in God when she was 14, Edith Stein would not only return to God but convert from Judaism to Catholicism.

As a young woman with profound intellectual gifts, Edith gravitated toward the study of philosophy. Along the way, the non-religious Edith would meet several Christians whose intellectual and spiritual lives she admired.

She graduated with the highest honors from Gottingen University in 1915, then served as a nurse in an Austrian field hospital during World War I. She returned to academia, earning her doctorate after writing a highly-regarded thesis on empathy.

Five years later while visiting friends, she spent an entire night reading the autobiography of the 16th century Carmelite nun Teresa of Avila. "When I had finished the book," she later recalled, "I said to myself: This is the truth." She was baptized on January 1, 1922, and would ultimately imitate St. Teresa by becoming a Carmelite, taking the name Teresa Benedicta of the Cross.

She went on to teach at a Dominican school and gave numerous public lectures on women's issues. She spent 1931 writing a study of St. Thomas Aguinas, and then accepted a university teaching position. In 1933, the rise of Nazism, combined with Edith's Jewish ethnicity, put an end to her teaching career.

St. Teresa Benedicta of the Cross died in the concentration camp at Auschwitz on August 9, 1942. Then-Blessed John Paul II canonized her in 1998 and proclaimed her a co-patroness of Europe the next year.
