

# **THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS**

First: Isaiah 35:1-6a, 10 Second: James 5:7-10 Gospel: Matthew 11:2-11

FOCUS: Make your hearts firm because the

coming of the Lord is at hand.

On Gaudete Sunday, we rejoice with all the earth in anticipation and preparation for Jesus' birth and the coming of his kingdom. We, like John the Baptist, are blessed and included in the kingdom of heaven, not because of what we do but what Jesus does for us.

#### LITURGY OF THE WORD:

In the first reading, Isaiah describes how the earth will rejoice when the Lord comes to save his people. In the second reading, James encourages patient hearts, for the return



of the Lord is at hand. In the Gospel, Jesus praises John the Baptist as God's messenger and assures John's disciples that he is the one John has sought.

### WHY THE CHURCH USES CANDLES

Every time we attend Mass, there are candles on the altar. Sometimes two. Sometimes four. Sometimes six or more. In nearly every church, there are votive candles, too. For us Catholics, they are omnipresent, automatically turning our thoughts and minds to prayer, to worship, to God.



Candles - with their light-giving flame - represent Christ, the Light of the World. Candles are traditionally made of 100 percent beeswax, which symbolizes the pure flesh of Our Lord, received from His immaculate Virgin Mother. (Although candles are not required to be pure

beeswax, they must at least contain some percentage of that wax.) The wick, enrobed in the wax, represents His soul, and the flame His divinity.

Because we offer Christ Himself on the altar in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, it is only fitting that such a powerful symbol be a required element at Mass.

The layers of meaning run deep. Candles also symbolize our prayers rising up to God. Candles contain the idea of sacrifice as well because they are an offering made by human hands that is consumed as they are burned. During the Mass, candles are a vivid representation of Christ offering Himself to the Father through the hands of the priest.

Candles represent the burning light of faith, and the flame reminds us of the Holy Spirit, the very Love of God dwelling within the hearts of the faithful and sanctifying our prayers and sacrifices.

Our use of candles need not be confined to those times that we are physically in church. Many people light candles at home as part of their personal prayer.
