Some of the relics that he will bring date back 2,000 years. Among them are those of St. Joseph, St. Maria Goretti, St. Therese of Lisieux (the "Little Flower"), St. Francis of Assisi, St. Anthony of Padua, St. Thomas Aquinas and St. Faustina Kowalska. There will also be a portion of the Veil of Our Lady and one of the largest remaining pieces of the True Cross in the world.

Throughout history, physical and spiritual healings have been worked in the presence of relics. Hundreds, if not thousands, have been reported back to this ministry. Articles of devotion, such as rosaries, and pictures of ill family members and friends may be brought to touch to the reliquaries as a means of intercession. There is no cost to attend.

A CALL TO SOCIAL JUSTICE



Beverly Anne LoGrasso, a member of the Cleveland Ursuline Sisters since 1965 and a selfdescribed "privileged white woman," has

served in education, administration and a prison ministry to women. But it was from behind the wheel of her car 20 years ago that her eyes were truly opened.

"The demands of freeway driving focused me on the road; in contrast, the drive through Cleveland's poorest neighborhoods focused me on striking income disparities," she says. "Travel as a spiritual act challenges me beyond hearing the Scripture readings from a safe and comfortable remove."
