DID YOU KNOW

The familiar Advent hymn "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" is an 1861 translation of a Latin hymn by John Mason Neale with powerful lyrics seeking wisdom, salvation, victory and safety.

The lyrics and the melody emerged independently. The Latin text is first documented in Germany in 1710, whereas the melody most familiar to us has its origins in 15th-century France.

In the Old Testament, the name Immanuel, which means "God with us," first appears in Isaiah 7:14. Although it says "*thou shalt call his name Immanuel,*" Mary and Joseph didn't give their son that name. Instead, they followed the directions given specifically to them in Matthew 1:21 (Joseph in a dream) and Luke 1:31 (Mary by the angel Gabriel) to name Him Jesus, which means "God saves."

Their son was given the name of Jesus, but he was also Emmanuel, God in the flesh (Matthew 1:23).

Immanuel is generally found in the Old Testament, which was recorded in Hebrew. Emmanuel, with an "E" reflects the recording in Greek of the New Testament.
