

Isn't that what God is doing? Writing the divine word of hope in the midst of our dark world?





A CALL TO SOCIAL JUSTICE

Catholic sisters in the United States are among those working to assist displaced Afghans resettle and restart their lives. Some sisters are working directly



with refugees. Others are readying places for them to stay. Some are packing toiletries and other needed goods.

Sr. Bette Ann Jaster, a member of the Dominican Sisters of Hope based in Ossining in Westchester County, is working with several groups with ties to local churches to welcome at least one refugee in the coming months.

Among the projects underway is a "welcome" quilt

for the newcomer, who is expected to join another Afghan woman previously resettled in Ossining.

The churches will help her acclimate to her new life. Tasks such as grocery shopping or arranging medical appointments can be overwhelming. "Everybody can do a piece," Jaster said.
