
FIRST SUNDAY **OF ADVENT**

First Reading: Jeremiah 33:14-16

The Lord will fulfill his promises to Israel and Judah.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 25:4-5,8-9,10,14

The Lord will teach us his paths.

Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 3:12-4:2 Paul encourages the Thessalonians to be holy

and to please God.

Gospel Reading: Luke 21:25-28,34-36 Jesus teaches his disciples to be vigilant so that they will be ready when the Son of Man comes in glory.

Focus: Prepare for the coming of the Lord.

As we begin Advent, our readings today offer wisdom in discerning what it means to prepare our hearts for the Lord. They are beckoning us to wake up and be attentive to what is around us, for God's time is at hand. We have the blessing of this season to prepare for the coming of the Lord, and to allow our hearts to be transformed.

Liturgy of the Word:

In the first reading, Jeremiah prophesies that the days of fulfillment are coming. A shoot will come from the line of David, and it will be a time of security and justice. In the second reading, Paul prays for the Thessalonians and exhorts them to conduct themselves in a manner pleasing to God. In the Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples what it will be like at the coming of the Son of Man, and that they are to be vigilant in anticipation of that day.
