FOCUS: Do everything for the glory of God.

"Do everything for the glory of God." Paul's words are both commanding and encouraging. As Christians, whatever we do ought to reflect who we are: Children of the Most High God, adopted sons and daughters of the Lord. We are sisters and brothers of Christ, and our very identity should permeate all we say and do. We are encouraged in this endeavor, and aided by grace, so that we can glorify God for his sake, and for the sake of the world's salvation.

## WHY ASHES

Ashes symbolize our mortality. They are a physical reminder that our bodies will decay, but our souls will live on in eternal life.

Fr. Anthony Kadavil (https://fr.tonyshomilies.com) reflects further: "The cross of ashes means that we are making a commitment - that we are undertaking Lent as a season of prayer and penitence, of dying to ourselves. It also describes our human condition: It says that we are



broken and need repair; that we are sinners and need redemption. Most importantly, it tells us that, as followers of Jesus Christ, we are to carry our crosses."

## LENTEN FAST AND ABSTINENCE

During the season of Lent, the Church urges the faithful to reflect a spirit of penance in their daily lives through performing acts of fast and abstinence.

• Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. This is a serious matter within Church law - even though Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day share the same day this year. It is suggested that Valentine's Day be celebrated the day before instead.

 Fasting means only one full meal a day. Two smaller meals may be eaten to maintain physical strength, but together they should not equal another full meal. Snacking between meals is not permitted. Catholics ages 18-59 are obligated to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

• Abstinence forbids the eating of meat or poultry. Those age 14 and older are obligated to abstain on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent.

The seven kids and six adults who gathered on the evening of February 2 to pack bags for the homeless didn't really notice how chilly Deacon John Hall was without a working furnace. Perhaps it's because they were thinking about how much colder it was outside, without any shelter at all.
