THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

First Reading: Jeremiah 17:5-8

Put trust and hope in the Lord, not in human beings.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 1:1-4,6

Blessed are those who follow the law of the Lord.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15:12,16-20

Our hope for resurrection is sure because Christ has been raised from the dead.

Gospel Reading: Luke 6:17,20-26

Jesus teaches the crowd the way to happiness.

Focus: God lifts us up to greater things.

Our readings today emphasize that our eyes should not be fixed on things of this world. We will not find true fulfillment on earth, where things pass away. Rather, our focus is to be on the Lord and following his ways. He lifts us up, no matter what hardship we are facing.

Liturgy of the Word:

In the first reading, the Lord says that those who trust in him are truly blessed. In the second reading, Saint Paul teaches the truth of the Resurrection. In the Gospel, Jesus preaches the Sermon



on the Plain to a crowd, lifting up those who yearn for more in this world and decrying those who have found false fullness in the world.

But here's a different option: Why not consider joining your fellow parishioners after Mass each Sunday of Lent to reflect and share your


thoughts on that day's Gospel reading?

LIVING THE BEATITUDES

If we want to understand the way of the Beatitudes, we must look to Christ. We must also look to the saints. especially those who walk the way of humility.

Two examples are St. Francis, the "little poor man of Assisi," whose spiritual biography is called the "Fioretti" or Little Flowers, and of course, the Little Flower herself, Therese of Lisieux, a Carmelite nun whose spirituality is called the "Little Way."

The little way of spiritual childhood is a way of trust and love, of experiencing loving confidence in God's goodness in all circumstances. The little way calls for deep awareness of our total dependence on God for all things and to abandon or surrender of ourselves, our lives, our fortunes, our future, to God's providence.

If we walk this way, we won't be swaved by the temptations and appeals in the cultural waters around us. A culture that idolizes wealth and strength creates a culture of fear and anxiety. To trust in God is to put aside fear and anxiety.

Consider the words of another great Carmelite saint, St. Teresa of Avila:

Let nothing disturb you. Let nothing frighten you. God never changes. Patience obtains all things. Whoever has God lacks nothing. God alone suffices.
