THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

First: Genesis 9:8-15 Second: 1 Peter 3:18-22 Gospel: Mark 1:12-15

FOCUS: Repent and believe in the Gospel.

To repent means to feel regret and sorrow and to change, or "turn from," what is evil. Gospel is a word meaning "good news." To "repent and believe in the Gospel" is the twofold call for the Christian, which is brought into profound focus during the Lenten season. This time of prayer and preparation for Easter shows there is indeed cause for regret and sorrow – and a need for change. And yet, what we are turning toward as we turn from sin is always cause for joy and hope.

LITURGY OF THE WORD:

In the first reading, God makes a covenant with Noah. In the second reading, Peter reflects on how the waters of the flood prefigured baptism. In the Gospel, Jesus is driven into the desert for 40 days before beginning to preach:



"The kingdom of God is hand. Repent, and believe in the Gospel."
