ARE YOU LOOKING FOR SOMETHING TO DO FOR LENT?


In keeping with the spirit of Lent, the Book Club is offering all parishioners a **Lenten Program of daily reflections** that will use the book "Lent in Plain Sight: A Devotion through Ten Objects," by Jill J. Duffield.

The author examines 10 ordinary objects that Jesus would have encountered on his way to Jerusalem – such as bread, shoes, coins, dust and

stones – and emphasizes how God works through even these seemingly insignificant items.

As these objects are individually reflected upon throughout the weeks of Lent, our sense of the holy will be honed as we more clearly grasp that God is present in all creation. What is ordinary is really extraordinary.
