THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD



Reading I: Isaiah 60: 1-6

God radiates light inside the city, so darkness surrenders, so to speak, in Jerusalem. All the nations come together to rebuild the city, including people associated with Abraham from the Arabian Peninsula. **Reading II: Ephesians 3: 2-3a, 5-6**

Paul's great insight into the mystery of Christ is that He wills the Gentile nations to be full participants in the Church. Its very foundation is based on Christ and the prophets and especially the Apostles.

The Gospel: Matthew 2: 1-2

The Magi were a group who did things like interpret dreams - or work in astrology and magic. Later tradition made them kings. Above all, they represent the Gentile world coming to Christ. Their gifts have meaning: Gold represents kingship, incense divinity and myrrh suffering. Or they can be interpreted Virtue, Prayer and Suffering.

GIFTS FIT FOR A KING

The word Epiphany means an illuminating discovery, realization or disclosure, and this is exactly what the Magi encountered when they journeyed to Bethlehem. The Epiphany completes the Christmas story; for without the Magi coming from distort lands, the birth of Christ



from distant lands, the birth of Christ might have only been known to the locals of Judea.

The Magi made the Epiphany a universal event. When they arrived, they saw an ordinary baby but "they prostrated themselves and did Him homage." This event was foretold in Psalm 72: "May all kings bow before Him, all nations serve Him."

The Three Wise Men, as the Magi are commonly called, brought three gifts for Jesus: Gold, frankincense (perfume) and myrrh (anointing oil). These are gifts fit for a king, and these three men are acknowledging that the baby in the manger is, indeed, a King.

I recently watched a Cary Grant movie titled "The Bishop's Wife" - this is obviously not a Catholic bishop and something the bishop said struck a chord. His Christmastime homily began with him talking about one empty stocking. He continued that at Christmas, everyone gets gifts; however, there is one empty stocking, the one belonging to Jesus.

That made me think: Here we have Jesus' birthday, and we are all giving each other gifts, which is not a bad thing, but what do we give Jesus? Obviously, He doesn't need any worldly things, so how can we fill His "stocking?"

We can fill it with a love-filled life. We can fill it with our humility and with kindness toward our fellow man. These are the gifts that the Lord would want from us.

Next year, during the hustle and bustle in the weeks leading up to Christmas, try to remember to "purchase" gifts to fill Jesus' stocking. And you won't even have to take out your credit card.
