# THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

First Reading: Isaiah 62:1-5

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 12:4-11

Gospel Reading: John 2:1-11

Focus: The Lord's love and care for us knows no

bounds.

It is comforting to know that, within the kingdom of God, all will be well in the end. Isaiah tells us of God's promise to Zion – which we know to be fulfilled in his Son, Jesus. And Jesus, whose ministry on earth was visible and transformative, takes care to ensure that the wedding feast is not spoiled while demonstrating that what he offers us is superior to anything the world may offer. God's care for us knows no bounds, and the goodness we experience here is but a taste of what is to come.

### Liturgy of the Word:

In the first reading, Isaiah speaks of God's care for Zion, and his promise of restoration and rejoicing. Zion will be like a cherished bride. In the second reading, Paul



writes of the same Spirit producing different individual gifts. In the Gospel, Jesus attends a wedding feast at Cana, and the wine runs short. He instructs the servers to fill jars with water, and when the water was drawn out to be tasted, it had become wine.


