

A CALL TO SOCIAL JUSTICE



In "Are we all in this together? Now is not the time to give up on building solidarity," Robert Christian (the editor of "Millennial," an online periodical on religion, politics and culture by millennial Catholics) doesn't mince words:

"At a time of widespread dysfunction, death and despair, what is missing is clear: Solidarity. As a society, we lack a sense of responsibility for the common good and the well-being of others," he writes.

"We do not have the sense that we are all in this together. And this is what is needed to rebuild our democracy and challenge a throwaway culture that discards the vulnerable," he continues.

It is very difficult for us to believe in Christ's words: "I did not come to call the virtuous, but sinners. ..."

Perhaps no psychologist has stressed the need of self-acceptance as the way to self-realization so much as Carl Jung. For Jung, self-realization meant the integration of the shadow. It is the growing ability to allow the dark side of our personality to enter into our awareness and thus prevent a one-sided life in which only that which is presentable to the outside world is considered as a real part of ourselves.

To come to an inner unity, totality and wholeness, every part of our self should be accepted and integrated. Christ represents the light in us. But Christ was crucified between two murderers and we cannot deny them, and certainly not the murderers who live in us.


