When Jesus was baptized in the Jordan, he heard a voice from heaven saying, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased" (Matthew 3:17). These words revealed Jesus' identity. But once I have received these words fully, I am set free from my compulsion to prove myself to the world and can live in it without belonging to it. Once I have accepted the truth that I am God's beloved child, unconditionally loved, I can be sent into the world to speak and to act as Jesus did.

# CALL TO SOCIAL JUSTICE

As reported in Commonweal magazine, the plight of the world's migrants and refugees seems to be worsening. In late November, 27 people drowned when



their inflatable dinghy capsized in the English Channel. In December, a speeding truck packed with refugees

from Central America flipped over on a busy road in southern Mexico; 54 passengers died. And at the border, which is pictured above, between Belarus and Poland, President Aleksandr Lukashenko ordered thousands of Middle Eastern migrants to force their way into Poland. Polish troops used tear gas and water cannons to drive them back, where they were then left to freeze in the forest. At least 11 died from exposure.

These events seemed to elicit little more than a shrug in Europe and the United States, but indifference toward the migrant crisis has lately become even more tinged with hostility to the migrants themselves – and opposition to the right to migrate at all.
