#### THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

First: Deuteronomy 30:10-14
Second: Colossians 1:15-20
Gospel: Luke 10:25-37

**FOCUS:** Love of God and love of neighbor are essential for the life of a believer.

Both the Old and New Testaments emphasize the centrality of loving God and our neighbor. In the first reading, we hear Moses stressing the importance of this in one of the final speeches of his life. In the Gospel, Jesus' parable of the Good Samaritan expands the understanding of "neighbor" to include those we might consider strangers or even enemies, and "love" modeled on his example of selflessness and sacrifice.

#### LITURGY OF THE WORD:

Moses entreats the people to return to the Lord, your God, with all your heart and all your soul. Paul writes of Christ as the firstborn of all creation, who reconciled all things in



himself. In the Gospel, Jesus converses with a scholar of the law and commends him for knowing the law. He then uses the parable of the Good Samaritan to challenge the scholar to treat everyone with mercy.
