FOCUS: The seed is the word of God, Christ is the

sower.

The image of the seed that Jesus offers in today's parable can call us to see more clearly and to listen more carefully. This seeing and hearing requires a posture of wonder, a posture of careful attentiveness. Can we slow down and marvel, watching with anticipation to see what God will do?

LITURGY OF THE WORD:

The first reading speaks of God's word, like rain, doing his will and achieving the end for which it is sent. In the second reading, we hear that creation is groaning, but that we have



the first fruits of the Spirit while we wait for redemption. In the Gospel, Jesus tells the parable of the sower and the seed that fell on rich soil.

BEREAVEMENT PROGAM SCHEDULED

There is no time limit in grief. There is no fast track to feeling better. And the life-changing loss of a loved one is not something to "get over."

Rather, while grief is universal, it is simultaneously a journey with a timeline as unique as the individual experiencing it.

At 9 a.m. Saturday, September 23, a six-week Bereavement Program will begin at St. Paul's. Julie Laurenzi, Liz Locatelli and Kate Gallaher Carson, who have completed the Archdiocese's training, will lead the sessions designed to support the bereaved as they continue on their own healing path. It is open to anyone struggling with the loss of a loved one – regardless of when that passing occurred.

Thereafter, the group will continue to meet from 9-10:30 Saturday mornings on September 30 and October 7. There will be no meeting on October 14, but the group will reconvene on October 21 and again on October 28.

The annual **Memorial Mass** to honor deceased relatives and friends will be celebrated at 10 a.m. on November 4. The bereavement program will then wrap up the following Saturday, November 11.

RAFFLE TICKET UPDATE

We are down to the last couple of weeks in this year's raffle fundraiser. As of July 11, 427 tickets have been sold, generating a total of \$10,675 – or \$5,337.50 for St. Paul's. Thank you to all who have participated. Tickets and payment are due to the office by August 1. Better yet, drop them in the collection boxes by July 30.



Some of you might be wondering: Where does the other half of the money go?

There are administrative costs: Printing the raffles, postage and, of course, the \$68,000 in prizes.

What remains is then used by Catholic Parish Initiatives, which orchestrates the raffle, for outreach. This year, a proverbial fishing pole is being provided to a diocese in a very poor region in Argentina.

That diocese, however, has a win-win governmental contract. It manufactures and distributes, for profit, all the cleaning supplies used in all the surrounding municipal buildings. The profits from those sales are then used to support training programs for electricians, plumbers, carpenters and other trades.

The manufacturing and training has been taking place in a rented building for years, but that location will no longer be available. The diocese was able to secure land, but needed construction funds, which this year's raffle is providing.

"We felt it was a unique opportunity to support a cause that would continue to support itself," says Paul Cappialli with Catholic Parish Initiatives of this year's "fishing-pole" investment.

A plaque will be installed in the foyer of the new building with the names of all the parishes that participated in the 2023 raffle, he says.

BILINGUAL VOLUNTEERS SOUGHT

Catholic Charities needs volunteers, particularly those fluent in Spanish, for its upcoming Community Legal Clinic in Monticello next Saturday, July 22.

Volunteers will meet with immigrants, discuss their journey to the United States, their life histories and work with Catholic Charities attorneys to inform them about their rights and legal options.
