Second: Ephesians 2:13 – 18
Gospel: Mark 6:30 – 34

FOCUS: The Lord is our shepherd, guiding and protecting us, and providing for all things.

From the time of Creation, the Lord has watched over us and guided us, judging our needs and our care for one another. When no one could shepherd us back to himself, he sent his Son to reconcile us to himself and free us from the bonds of sin. He sees who and where we are and knows what we need, providing for all things.

LITURGY OF THE WORD:

shepherd his people so they no longer fear and tremble. Saint Paul writes that through the sacrifice of Christ, we have become close to God. In the Gospel, the Apostles and Jesus go off to rest and are followed by a vast crowd. Moved by their lack of a shepherd to guide them, Jesus teaches them many things.
