THE PATRON SAINT OF LOST ITEMS

Saint Anthony, whose feast day is June 13, was born Fernando Martins in 1195 to a wealthy Portuguese family. He ultimately joined the Franciscan friars after entering the priesthood. While preaching in Morocco, he became extremely sick and eventually convalesced in a Franciscan hermitage in Tuscany.

It was there he was asked by his superior to speak as guided by the Holy Spirit before his community and visiting Dominican friars. Though he objected at first, Anthony finally agreed and delivered an articulate and

moving homily that impressed both groups. Soon, news of his eloquence reached Francis of Assisi. In Anthony, Francis found a friend.

In 1224, Francis entrusted his friars' educational pursuits to Anthony. Anthony had a book of psalms that contained notes and comments to help when teaching students and, in a time when a printing press was not yet invented, it was something



he greatly valued. When a novice decided to leave the hermitage, he stole Anthony's treasured book. When Anthony discovered it was missing, he prayed it would be found and returned to him. The thief not only returned the book, which is preserved at a Franciscan friary, but he returned to the Order as well.

Anthony was 35 years old when he died, and he was canonized within a year by Pope Gregory IX. His body was exhumed more than 30 years after his death. It had completely decomposed – except for his tongue, which remains incorrupt to this day.

"By preserving St. Anthony's tongue from corruption, God has shown us that He approved the saint's mission and, in particular, his preaching, which he performed mainly though his tongue and vocal apparatus," said Fr. Enzo Poiana, former rector of the Basilica of St. Anthony in Padua.

St. Anthony is typically depicted with a book and the Infant Jesus. He is commonly referred to today as the "finder of lost articles" and is also credited with many miracles involving lost people.

O Holy St. Anthony gentlest of Saints, your love for God and charity for His creatures, made you worthy, when on earth, to possess miraculous powers. Encouraged by this thought, I implore you to obtain for me (request). O gentle and loving St. Anthony, whose heart was ever full of human sympathy, whisper my petition into the ears of the sweet Infant Jesus, who loved to be folded in your arms. The gratitude of my heart will ever be yours. Amen.
