THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

First: Genesis 14:18-2
Second: 1 Corinthians 11:23-2

Gospel: Luke 9:11b-17

FOCUS: Here in the great mystery of the Eucharist, Christ fulfills his promise to be with his people always.

Today we profess and acknowledge the Eucharist as the source and summit of our faith. Here, under the appearance of bread and wine, Christ's body and blood are broken and shared, and we celebrate Christ's enduring presence with us. Here we encounter his compassionate love and healing, and here we are strengthened and nourished to live the Gospel.

LITURGY OF THE WORD:

In the first reading, Melchizedek – a priest of God Most High – brings bread and wine to Abram and blesses him. Paul writes to the Corinthians, telling them what he received from



the Lord: That the Lord offered his body and blood to his disciples. Paul says, "As often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes." In the Gospel, Jesus speaks to the crowds about God's kingdom and heals all who need healing. He then feeds them (about five thousand in number), using five loaves and two fish.

A CALL TO JUSTICE...

"Sadly, hardly anyone in the country knows about the strong and comprehensive position on gun control taken by the U.S. Catholic bishops. Bishops rarely talk about it. Catholics don't hear about it from the pulpit in church. The media does not report it.

"Perhaps the Catholic clergy fear upsetting the faithful by talking about gun control, but according to

a 2012 PRRI poll, 62 percent of Catholics support stricter gun control, way higher than the 35 percent support coming from evangelical Christians.

"Catholic social teaching has been referred to as the church's best-kept secret. The bishops' response to gun violence should no longer be a secret. It should be



preached from the rooftops," writes Jesuit Fr. Thomas Reese in a recent column.

Chicago Cardinal Blase Cupich did not mince words after the Uvalde massacre: "Who are we as a nation if we do not act to protect our children? ... The Second Amendment, unlike the second commandment, did not come down from Sinai."

The bishops, even the most conservative, have been speaking out against gun violence since 1994. They call for a total assault-weapon ban, limitations on high-capacity weapons and accessories, and full background checks on all gun purchases.
