#### THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

Job 38:1. 8-11 First: Second: 2 Corinthians 5:14-17 Gospel: Mark 4:35-41 FOCUS: God's love for us is more powerful than any challenge we face.

The readings today reflect God's profound love for us, even in the face of turbulent times. When our faith is challenged or we are distraught, we must trust that God is with us always and have complete faith that his love is more powerful than the storms of our lives.

#### LITURGY OF THE WORD:

In the first reading, the Lord speaks to Job out of the storm and reminds Job of the divine power that has protected him. In the second reading, Saint Paul reflects that the love of Christ has



brought about a new way of life. In the Gospel, a violent storm comes up as Jesus and his disciples are in a boat. Jesus calms the storm and then asks the disciples: "Do you not yet have faith?"

## ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST

Patron saint of baptism, bird dealers, converts, lambs, monastics, printers, tailors and more

On Monday, June 24, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Nativity of Saint John the Baptist, and

on August 29, the memorial of his martyrdom. There is no other saint for whom the Church honors both events. Generally, it



celebrates only their "birth into heaven," with the exception, of course, of Jesus, the Son of God (December 25, his birth, and Good Friday, his death) and the Virgin Mary (September 8, her birth, and August 15, her Assumption into heaven).

Jesus himself said, "Amen, I say to you, among those born of women there has been none greater than John the Baptist" (Mt. 11:11). He was the last of the great prophets of Israel, the first to testify to Jesus, who initiated a baptism for the forgiveness of sins and, in this context, baptized Jesus. Ultimately, he was martyred defending the Judaic law.
