



#### Reading I: Exodus 24: 3-8

Moses, as leader, ratifies the Covenant between God and the people. The blood of the animal is splashed on both the altar and the people as the sign of this union.

#### Reading II: Hebrews 9: 11-15

Just as the Hebrew high priest had the right of access to the Holy of Holies because he bore the blood of the sacrificial animals with him, so Jesus the High Priest of the New Covenant, by the shedding of His Blood has access to the heavenly sanctuary.

#### The Gospel: Mark 14: 12-16, 22-26

Jesus had pre-arranged the room in the upper story of a house in Jerusalem. Mark connects the bread and wine at the meal with Jesus' imminent death.

# THE CHURCH'S GREATEST TREASURE

This weekend's readings tell us it is suddenly Holy Thursday again, the night that changed the world. They take us back to the Last Supper just where we left it, without much time to celebrate the miraculous change brought to the bread and wine that had passed around that famous table. Yes, we acknowledge the events of this first night of the Triduum. But at that time, we were collectively conscious of Christ's imminent death. It hardly seemed right to be celebrating.

But now, on this side of the Resurrection, it is truly right and just that we give full recognition, honor and thanksgiving for what Jesus has given us. It is the church's true and greatest treasure: The Body and Blood of Christ, "Corpus Christi" in the traditional Latin name of today's feast. It is not our real estate, nor the tangible valuables in painted art or sculpture. Not even the Gospels have the first rank. For this sacrament is Christ Himself: Body, blood, soul and divinity.

It all began when the real Jesus took real bread and wine and identified Himself with them. With centuries of church history behind us, concomitant with the

development of her doctrine and devotion, more could be said and



has been. Saints male and female, together with popes and theologians have had their say, and we can all benefit from them. But the fact remains that we start with the remarkably simple ritual gesture done by a Man who was facing death.

It happened on a night two thousand plus years ago in the upper room of a borrowed house in the city of Jerusalem amid that city's most hectic time of year, the annual Passover. It happened in a world lit only by fire. But the greater fire of mutual love between mankind and God has stayed lit, despite the tempests of war and human folly ever since.

In his new book, "Things Worth Dying For," Charles J. Chaput, OFM Cap., retired archbishop of Philadelphia, posed questions to a broad selection of his many friends. "What gives you the most joy about the church" was responded to by a convert, husband and father: "The Eucharist, without question ... The church gives me a home with spiritual peers I never had before and is more of a family than I ever experienced. Most of all, the church gives us the sacraments, and they've allowed me to encounter Jesus with greater intimacy than I ever knew."

Converts get us to snap out of any stupid stupor that the easy availability of the Eucharist can induce.

Of course, as members of the living church, present in the world with all her strengths and weaknesses, we have to remember that other meaning of "Corpus Christi;" namely, that we are also the Body of Christ, with Him as our Head.

We have a solution. The week of June 21, St. Mary Recycle Mission will be stopping by St. Paul's. That will give you the last couple of weeks of spring to spring clean your home of **unwanted religious goods** and then drop them off at the church office.

Kimberly Walters spearheads this Lancaster, PA,based rescue-and-recycle mission that was born in a Dumpster more than 20 years ago when usable items cleared from a church basement were found. Since then, hundreds of thousands of items have been collected, cleaned, repaired and sometimes repurposed before being provided to churches, convents and schools worldwide. Sometimes it's a poor parish that reaches out for altar basics it cannot afford. Other times, a church might be facing replacing everything that a natural disaster claimed.

So gather your medals and holy cards, vestments from the family priest (any condition), altar ware, framed pictures, small prayer books (please, no librarytype books) and even your broken rosaries.

There will also be a collection box in the hall through **June 20** for your convenience.
