## THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

First: Jeremiah 31:31-34 Second: Hebrews 5:7-9 Gospel: John 12:20-33 FOCUS: Choose the path of surrender in service to the Lord.

# SECOND IN THE SERIES TO START

Following Christ is the second part of the ChristLife evangelization process. It is designed to help people who have completed the Discovering Christ course to grow in friendship and union with God; however, participation in the prior course is not a requirement. # THEY ROSE TO THE OCCASION!

Bread is a rich symbol of our faith and a staple at

our **First Eucharist Retreats**. Bread symbolizes life. Bread symbolizes feasting together. And most importantly, Jesus broke bread at the Last Supper and said: "This is my body."

As he has done over the years, Mr. Rick (Dzurilla) opened the retreat last Saturday with a lesson in bread-making. The 10 children gathered around as he told them how Jesus will lift up their lives just as the yeast lifts up the bread.

He added the wet ingredients to the flour, mixed it a bit and had them touch the sticky dough. A few said, "Yuck," but they all agreed it was nice and warm. "I told them that is how they will feel after receiving the Body of Christ, and not just on their First Communion,



but when they come to church every Sunday."

"The retreat offers many teaching moments," said Peg Hoblin, the new director of religious education, who was impressed by how enthusiastic and happy the children were.

Then it was their turn to make individual loaves. Not only did they love the feeling of the dough between their hands, but they were eager to assist one another.

While the dough was rising, the children were engaged by Tony Bellizzi, guest inspirational speaker and youth minister, who, like the yeast and flour, has become a retreat mainstay. Reactions were priceless upon seeing their loaves again, which had now risen during that presentation. "Wow! Look at my bread."

There was also time to make what have been described as quite creative banners, which will hang from the pews on May 11, the day they make their First Holy Communion.

After baking, the communal loaf was sliced and shared. The kids were impressed - and anxious to enjoy their bread with their families that evening.

And on Monday morning, small flour handprints on a door jamb were a joyful retreat reminder!
