
MARK YOUR CALENDARS



SECOND IN THE SERIES TO START

Following Christ is the second part of the ChristLife evangelization process. It is designed to help people who have completed the Discovering Christ course to grow in friendship and union with God; however, participation in the prior course is not a requirement. Following Christ examines how to live as Catholic disciples of Jesus Christ in today's world, based on basic disciplines and truths that have been practiced by Christians from the time of the early Church. Each weekly session includes four components: Prayer, video teaching, group discussion and practical applications.
