
SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

The Sixth Sunday of Easter, Year C, brings us closer to the heart of the early Church's journey. We are encouraged to seek unity, listen to the Holy Spirit and embrace the peace Jesus gives us.

- Unity in Faith: The first reading shows the early Church dealing with disagreements, reminding us that unity in faith requires listening and compromise.
- Guidance of the Holy Spirit: The Holy Spirit helps guide the decisions of the apostles in Acts 15:28. The Holy Spirit continues to guide the Church today.
- New Jerusalem: The second reading describes the vision of the New Jerusalem. It represents the hope and promise of a future with God.
- God's Presence: In Revelation 21:22-23, we learn there is no need for a temple because God's presence is everywhere, reminding us that God is always with us.
- Obedience to Jesus: The Gospel speaks about keeping Jesus' word as a sign of love. Obeying Jesus' teachings brings us closer to him.
- Gift of Peace: Jesus promises peace in John 14:27. This peace is different from what the world offers and calms our hearts.

Funerals are a fact of life, and the older we get, the more frequent they can become. Yet, funerals find many of us "tongue-tied." We want to be supportive but feel awkward. A common question is: "What should I say" – or not say?

Remember that your presence itself is a gift. Families may not recall what you say, but they will remember you were there. Attend the visitation or funeral and sign the book.

Appearing too upbeat may not be helpful, and offering platitudes may not be comforting. For example, don't say, "I know exactly how you feel" or "God never gives us more than we can handle" or "Just try to be strong."

Instead, a simple and sincere "My condolences" is often enough, or "I'm thinking of you and your family during this difficult time." If you have more of a connection with the bereaved, phrases such as "We all need support in times like this, and I'm here for you," "I know how special she was to you" or "Your Mom was an inspiration to me" are all appropriate.

If you have a positive story, telling it may evoke other memories and be a source of healing. However, be mindful of how many people are in line behind you waiting to pay their respects and adjust the amount of time you spend talking. Greeting the guests can be overwhelming and exhausting for the family.

Another option would be to share a memory in a note sent shortly after the funeral. This also gives you time to read your message out loud and ask yourself, "How would I feel if someone wrote this to me?"
