## THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

First: Wisdom 6:12-16 Second: 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18 or 4:13-14 Gospel: Matthew 25:1-13 FOCUS: Always be prepared to welcome Christ, for we know neither the day nor the hour of his arrival.

The Gospel parable reminds us to keep vigil for Jesus. It is easy to get distracted by the details of work, family life and other responsibilities so that we forget the real purpose and mission of our lives. Let's each take a moment to contemplate how we can live out our vocation in life, readying ourselves for the Lord's coming.

#### LITURGY OF THE WORD:

The first reading speaks of the attributes of wisdom and the importance of the love of wisdom, as it is the perfection of prudence. In the second reading, Paul encourages people of faith to hold on to hope in the



Resurrection. In the Gospel, Jesus tells a parable where five virgins were ready for the bridegroom and five were not. Those who were not ready missed out on the wedding feast.

## MAKE YOUR ADVENT WREATH

Our annual **Advent wreath-making** afternoon will take place at 1 p.m. **Sunday, November 26.** There are supplies to accommodate the first 45 families to sign up, which can be done beginning this weekend in Deacon John Hall.

The Advent wreath, woven with symbolism, has been used by Christians in their spiritual preparation for Christmas since the Middle Ages.

The four candles represent the four weeks of Advent. Purple candles remind us of prayer, penance and preparatory sacrifices, while the rose candle reflects rejoicing at the midpoint of Advent. The light of the candles signifies Christ, the Light of the World.

The candles sit in a circle of greens. The circle has no beginning or end, and the evergreens also depict continuous life, symbolizing our immortal soul.

Back when the **Prayer Blanket Ministry** was born, much of the fleece could be purchased for \$3.99 a yard. Today, that cost has soared to \$25 a yard, and the sales are not as plentiful as they once were. Still, this ministry

continues to be self-funded, not requiring any financial support from the church.

The Goshen Christmas House Tour, a fundraiser for Catholic Charities of Orange, Sullivan and Ulster, takes place on Saturday, December 2 (snow date Sunday, December 3), with three tour options this year.

Known as the **Apostle of the Impossible**, St. Jude is of the Church's most beloved saints, the one to whom people turn when they are desperate and have tried everything else.

The arm of the saint, which is making its way across North America as part of a pilgrimage, was separated from the greater portion of his remains several centuries ago. It was placed in a wooden reliquary carved in the shape of an upright arm that seems to be imparting a blessing. Next Sunday, November 19, the Marian Shrine in Stony Point will host this relic.

The exhibit and veneration begins at 2:30 p.m. A Mass in honor of St. Jude will be celebrated at 5 p.m., and the relic can be viewed until 9 p.m. There is no cost, but freewill donations will be accepted.
