#### THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

Proverbs 31:10-13, 19-20, 30-31 First: Second: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-6 Gospel: Matthew 25:14-30 or 25:14-15, 19-21 FOCUS: We are given talents to share.

The Lord has told us that he will come again at the end of time to judge the living and the dead. Though the timing is unpredictable, this end is inevitable and inescapable. Let us be prepared to give an account of the ways in which we have used our gifts for the benefit of others.

BEREAVEMENT PROGRAM RECAP

Few would argue that life is at its most painful when a cherished loved one passes. That loss is often lifechanging, and there's no shortcut to feeling better. For some, the grief can be overwhelming if not suffocating. Others put on a more stoic mask, but the anguish is still there, just below the surface. And while grief is universal, the journey toward healing is not – although a common thread among the 12 "hurting hearts" in this fall's inaugural Bereavement Program was that they all said they joined reluctantly.

For six weeks, Julie Laurenzi, Liz Locatelli and Kate Gallaher Carson, who completed the Archdiocese's bereavement training, led the program that included conversation, prayer and personal reflections. Ultimately, there was a realization that suffering alone does not foster forward movement. Rather, sharing grief lightens the burden and allows hope to forge a new path.

One participant summed it up nicely: "I believe not one single person left the course untouched or unchanged."
