CHRIST THE KING

NOVEMBER 24, 2024



First Reading - Daniel 7:13-14

I saw the Son of Man receive eternal authority and glory from the Ancient One. His everlasting kingdom will never be destroyed and all nations will serve him.

Second Reading - Revelation 1:5-8

Jesus, the faithful witness and eternal king, loves us, freed us from sin and made us a kingdom. He will return, and everyone will see him.

Gospel - John 18:33B-37

Pilate questioned Jesus about being the King of the Jews. Jesus explained that his kingdom is not of this world and that he came to testify to the truth.

Focus: Jesus is King and Lord of all both now and forever.

The readings from Daniel and the Book of Revelation share an apocalyptic vision of the Son of Man coming on the clouds to rule over all peoples. In John's Gospel, on the other hand, Jesus is already king. His everlasting authority comes from God. For his disciples – those who listen to his voice – eternal life is already possible.

Liturgy of the Word:

Daniel sees a vision of the Son of man coming on the clouds, and his kingship will not be destroyed. In the second reading, Jesus is the ruler of the kings of the earth, and he has made us a kingdom of priests. He is coming amid the clouds for all to see. In the Gospel, Jesus tells Pilate that his kingdom does not belong to this world.
