THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

First: Malachi 1:14b–2:2b, 8-10
Second: 1 Thessalonians 2:7b-9, 13
Gospel: Matthew 23:1-12
FOCUS: Whoever humbles himself will be exalted.

At the heart of today's Gospel is this truth: The greatest among you must be your servant. Jesus' scorn for the scribes and Pharisees was based on their inability to understand



this. Jesus took on the role of servant, giving his very life on behalf of the world.

LITURGY OF THE WORD:

The prophet Malachi in today's first reading explains the consequences of showing partiality – division from one another and from God. In the second reading, Paul speaks of his affectionate love for the Thessalonian Church. In the Gospel, Jesus chastises the hypocrisy of the scribes and Pharisees, calling for humility and service.
