First Reading

Wisdom 7:7-11

Wisdom is preferred above gold and silver.

Second Reading

Hebrews 4:12-13

The Word of God exposes the heart.

Gospel Reading

Mark 10:17-30 (shorter form Mark 10:17-27)

A man with many possessions asks Jesus what he must do to gain eternal life.

Focus: Seek Christ above all else.

Jesus is the Word of God, living and effective, able to discern the thoughts and reflections of our hearts. Jesus is the wisdom of God, more precious than power, riches or beauty. To follow Christ is to place him at the center of our lives, to seek him before all the good things of this world, including ties to family, friends and colleagues.

Liturgy of the Word:

In the first reading, Solomon prayed for wisdom and received all good things "in her company." The Letter to the Hebrews says the Word of God is "living



and effective," able to discern thoughts of the heart. In the Gospel, a man asks Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life. Jesus tells him to sell what he has, give to the poor and follow him.

MINISTRY SPOTLIGHT

Prayer Blankets

They are not merely blankets; they are messengers of hope and caring that are sent from the St. Paul's community to parishioners, their family members and friends. It's estimated in

the eight years since the inception of the Prayer Blanket Ministry that the colorful fleece covers have brought comfort and warmth to about 1,000 people not only in Orange County but nationwide.

Rebecca Suchy has been a catechist for 11 years, focusing on seventh- and eighth-graders. As such, in 2016 she was seeking a way



to make the required service hours more meaningful for the Confirmation candidates. Her research uncovered no-sew prayer blankets, and the proverbial lightbulb went off.

With Fr. Sean's input, it was decided that this would be a ministry that also offered service hours. Twice a year there are bake sales, in which the students participate, to raise funds for supplies. Although coupons are now rare, Rebecca still scrutinizes the sales to stretch every dollar. After purchases are made, the ministry volunteers meet with the students on a Friday evening to make the blankets, which are blessed at the following weekend's Masses. In between, the ministry gathers when blanket reserves run low – typically at least two more times a year.

"Thanks to the bake sale and donations, this has always been a self-funded ministry," says Rebecca, despite the fact that the cost of the fabric has almost doubled in eight years – and a pair of sturdy scissors alone is \$22. "And polar fleece is tough on scissors!"

The next bake sale is the weekend of **October 26-27**, and Rebecca hopes that people come to Mass with a sweet tooth to satisfy. She is also hoping for a few more ministry volunteers.

"It's very laid back and not a huge commitment," says Rebecca. "People just come when they can."

But the joy this ministry brings is immeasurable.

"We hear all the time sentiments like, 'I love my blanket and use it all the time' or 'I bring my blanket every time I have to go to the hospital.' "

Students come to understand what the blankets mean and make requests for their ill loved ones, too.


