### THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

#### **First Reading**

Isaiah 53:10-11

Through his suffering, the servant of Yahweh will justify many.

#### **Second Reading**

Hebrews 4:14-16

Jesus is the high priest who sympathizes with our weakness.

#### Gospel Reading

Mark 10:35-45 (shorter form Mark 10:42-45)

Jesus teaches that those who wish to be great must be the servant of all.

Focus: The Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many.

In contrast to the pressures to seek power, comfort and fame, our Church proclaims humble service. We are called to gaze on our king, enthroned on a cross, ornamented with wounds. We are told in no uncertain terms that the only path to greatness in the kingdom of God is the path of self-giving love.

### **Liturgy of the Word:**

In the first reading, the prophet Isaiah prophesies about the servant who justifies many through his suffering. In the Letter to the Hebrews, the author writes that we have a great high priest who sympathizes with our weaknesses. In the Gospel, Jesus says that the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve.

# MINISTRY SPOTLIGHT

#### **Altar Servers**

Being an altar server is not as difficult as it might seem to the youngsters in the pews during Mass.

"But it is a good way to ease into leadership roles," says Andy Britto, a former altar server himself who now

coordinates the Altar Server Ministry with his wife, Alison. "It is one small, quick step on the journey to serving others, which we are called to do."

When Andy and Alison were asked two years ago if they could take on this



responsibility, of course they agreed. Their son, Joe, had been an altar server for about five years at that point, and Tommy had recently started following in his brother's footsteps.

"I like being an example, a good role model for the younger kids, including my brother," says Joe. "And I am helping to support the St. Paul's community. ...

"My first Mass, I thought people would laugh. It is intense up there with people looking at you. But I just focus on the one thing I am doing in my role, and it takes that fear away of people looking at you."

"It's not the end of the world if a mistake is made," says Andy. "No one is critiquing."

"And the deacons and Fr. Sean are very helpful," says Alison.

But more altar servers would be helpful, too.

"When there are two at each Mass, the more seasoned altar server helps the other one to feel more comfortable and to build confidence through repetition. It's easier to ask questions of a peer," she says.

Right now, there are only five altar servers to rotate through the Sunday schedule – and no one to schedule on Saturday.

"Ephraim serves when he is available," says Alison of the familiar face to many 5-o'clockers who is now a young adult with new responsibilities.

The Altar Server Ministry needs youth who are responsible, mature, have made their First Holy Communion and can commit to serve at least once every two months or more, depending upon how many altar servers there are. Training will be provided.

"It's not as hard as it might look," says Andy. "And there are no speaking roles."

"Give it a chance," says Joe to anyone who might be thinking about taking this step. "I didn't want to do it at first. I thought it would be boring."

"Joe now prides himself in this position," says Alison. For more information, email:

## THE SAINTS COME MARCHING IN

The feast of **All Saints Day** reflects the spiritual connection between those in Heaven and on Earth.

In the early years when the Roman Empire persecuted Christians, as martyrs died for their faith, the Church set aside special days to honor them. Ultimately, there were too many martyrs for each to be given their own day. So in the eighth century, **November 1** was designated by Pope Gregory III as a day to collectively remember them.

All Saints Day is dedicated to the saints or all who have attained heaven. All Saints Day should not be confused with **All Souls Day**, which is observed on November 2, and is dedicated to commemorating the faithful departed.

All Saints Day is a Holy Day of Obligation. Mass will be celebrated at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, **November 1.** There will be no evening or vigil Mass.
