

THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

First Reading

Jeremiah 31:7-9

The Lord declares himself to be the Father of Israel.

Second Reading

Hebrews 5:1-6

Christ was made high priest by God.

Gospel Reading

Mark 10:46-52

Jesus restores sight to the blind man, Bartimaeus Focus: Have courage to follow the Lord on the way when he answers prayers.

In today's Gospel, Jesus asks Bartimaeus, "What do you want me to do for you?" Bartimaeus wanted his sight, and the Lord granted it. Bartimaeus then followed him on the way. As we encounter the Lord in the Eucharist, let us ask him for the courage to not only ask him for what we need, but to follow him on the way when he answers.

Liturgy of the Word

Jeremiah prophesies that the Lord will bring back his people from the land to which they were exiled. The author of Hebrews explains that just as the high priest can act as such only if he has



been called by God to do so, so also Christ acts as our high priest because God has appointed him to do so. In the Gospel, Jesus restores the sight of Bartimaeus.

MINISTRY SPOTLIGHT

Ushers

Since 2020, there's a new way to define time: BP and AP or before-pandemic and after-the-pandemic.

BP there were plenty of ushers for all the Masses at St. Paul's – no scheduling required. It was as if they magically appeared week after week without fail. Then came the shutdown and gradual return to AP normalcy. We had greeters – and these volunteers continue to play an important, welcoming role – but no traditional ushers.

"It hit me last Christmas as I was in the pew with our out-of-state relatives how much money the church was losing by not having



ushers. Parishioners knew about the collection boxes but not visitors. ... And I knew ushers would be needed if we were to return to bringing up the gifts," says John Botti, who then spoke with Fr. Sean about formalizing this ministry.

Beginning last January, there has been a lead usher designated – yes, that means scheduled – for each Mass. That person arrives ahead of the crowd and ensures there are three others to assist with the collection.

"We try to mix it up by asking different people if they'd like to usher for the day," says John.

The lead usher also ensures there are people to bring up the gifts and reminds the gift-bearers when to step to the back of the church. If a late-comer is having trouble finding a seat, an usher can assist. And finally, the ushers keep the Communion lines going.

As during BP times, many of the lead ushers assume a weekly ushering role, even if they're not "scheduled." They simply like to usher.

"Still, we need a few more people to step up as lead ushers," says John.

The more people available to do so, the less of a burden it is on the others, especially when vacations and illness are factored in.

"This is really easy to do – and you're here anyway," says John.
