THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

First reading: Genesis 2:18-24 Responsorial Psalm: 127(128) Second reading: Hebrews 2:9-11 Gospel: Mark 10:2-16. Focus: God desires for us to love and be loved, as he loves.

From the very beginning, the Lord made us to not be alone: We were created for a relationship with him and with one another. There is something truly worthy of awe – awesome – in knowing that God, the Creator of the Universe and all things, desires for us to love and be loved, as he loves. We are not just his creation; we are his children. His only Son is our brother. The kingdom belongs to us, if we embrace it with the childlike wonder it deserves.

Liturgy of the Word:

In the first reading, God creates a suitable partner for man, forming woman from his rib. In the second reading, the author writes about how Christ was, for a little while, made lower than the angels and therefore is



not ashamed to call us brothers. In the Gospel, Jesus answers the Pharisees' question regarding the legality of divorce and reiterates the permanence of the marriage bond.

MINISTRY SPOTLIGHT : The Archangels

There's no public speaking involved. And they are allowed to be checking their phones during Mass.





For Tom Fobert, pictured above left, volunteering for, **St. Paul's Safety Committee** also known as the **Archangels** (formed by Archdiocese mandate in 2017), just made sense.

Tom's ah-ha moment came a couple of years ago after a presentation by Dennis Branham, the group's coordinator, pictured above right. Tom was looking for a way to get more involved, something that wouldn't conflict with everything else going on in his life.

"I'm already there at church with my family anyway," he says.

And although some members have first responder, military and/or medical experience, Tom doesn't – and it's NOT required.

What is required is the ability to observe and communicate any concerns with other team members. There are usually at least two at each Mass, but the number of volunteers has plummeted from 42 to just a handful today. Dennis is hoping people will become aware that along with bringing a measure of safety to the church, it's also a convenient way to serve.

An expectation of an Archangel is to take charge of a medical situation should one arise – control the space; delegate someone to call 911 so that there aren't 20 people doing the same thing; reach out to the nurse or other medical professional at Mass to assist until the ambulance arrives and the like.

More frequently, though, it's a matter of using the phone to monitor the cameras for latecomers – or that rare occasion when someone at the church door needs direction.

"It's also provided me the opportunity to meet new people," says Tom. "And the training is phenomenal."

Dennis has arranged the next training session for Monday evening, **November 4**, in Deacon John Hall. Existing Archangels will be recertified in CPR and use of the AED unit. Any new volunteers would be trained at that time, too.
