Spiritual checkups are often performed during times of transition or crisis. And while our Adult Faith Formation Committee had planned a presentation on Spiritual Direction, the Spiritual Exercises and Carmelite Spirituality before the pandemic hit, these tools are probably even more relevant today to more people than ever before. The spotlight this week is on:

Spiritual Direction


Spiritual direction is not pastoral counseling or confession. Rather, it is an invitation to cultivate a deeper, more personal relationship with God.

The practice has biblical roots. After all, the apostles acted as "guides" who introduced others to Christ. But the universal call to holiness of Vatican II has enabled those roots to spread.

"As she has never failed to do, again today the Church continues to recommend the practice of spiritual direction," Pope Benedict XVI said in 2011, "not only to all those who wish to follow the Lord up

close, but to every Christian who wishes to live responsibly their baptism; that is, the new life in Christ."

Spiritual direction is considered a journey of three presences: God, a qualified and trained spiritual director and a



Spiritual direction, an important and revered ministry, is an ongoing process and practice that includes meetings every four to six weeks. Confidential discussions focus on God's presence and movement as revealed through prayer, relationships and the events of the directee's life.

POWER, PRIVILEGE AND RACE

Do you want to address racism but don't know where to begin?

Faith & Racial Equity: Exploring Power & Privilege is an eight-session program that awakens a realization of how the economic systems, public policies, cultural norms and hidden biases empower some and oppress others.

The first half of the program lays the groundwork for understanding and identifying racial privilege. Sessions 5-8 take a deeper dive into specific issues related to power and privilege.
