THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

Sirach 27:30-28:7 First: Second: Romans 14:7-9 Gospel: Matthew 18:21-35

FOCUS: We cannot claim forgiveness only for

ourselves; God's mercy is for all.

We are all the same flesh: Fellow sinners, servants and debtors, and God's mercy is for us all. We cannot seek pardon for ourselves yet refuse mercy to others. We must forgive as we have been forgiven. In the community of God's covenant, mercy is shared, not seven times but seventy-seven times, as Jesus teaches.

LITURGY OF THE WORD:

The first reading teaches that in order to be forgiven, one must forgive. In the second reading, Paul teaches that none of us lives and dies for oneself, but together for the Lord. In the



Gospel, Jesus tells the parable of the debtor who refuses to share with others the mercy he has been shown by his master.
