SPIRITUAL DIRECTION AND MORE

Spiritual checkups are often performed during times of transition or crisis. And while our Adult Faith Formation Committee had planned a presentation on Spiritual Direction, the Spiritual Exercises and Carmelite Spirituality before the pandemic hit, these tools are probably even more relevant today to more people than ever before. The spotlight this week is on:

The Spiritual Exercises

The Spiritual Exercises grew out of St. Ignatius Loyola's personal journey from a carefree, materialistic youth to noble soldier and ultimately to founder of the Society of Jesus. In 1521, the then-officer in the Spanish Army was bedridden at a family castle while his leg healed from a cannonball's wrath. He fancied books about chivalry to encourage his heroic daydreams, but there were none. Instead, he spent the year reading about the saints and the life of Christ. He noticed a shift in his thinking: When he imagined himself performing the same deeds as the saints, there was peace and contentment in his heart. But when he envisioned himself courting the ladies and engaging in military feats, he felt empty.

He left the castle with a zeal to serve God, which included time spent living in a cave, seeking to grow in union with God and to discern God's will. He kept a journal that noted his emotions as he gained spiritual insight, which would become the foundation for



The Spiritual Exercises. He added to these notes as he directed other people and discovered what "worked."

The Spiritual Exercises are a compilation of meditations, prayers and contemplative practices he developed to help people deepen their relationship with God. For centuries, the Exercises took the form of a 30-day retreat spent in solitude and silence. In recent years, there has been a renewed emphasis that this is a program for laypeople. The most common way of going through the Exercises now is as a "retreat in daily life," also called the 19th Annotation Retreat, which involves a months-long program of daily prayer and weekly meetings with a spiritual director.

St. Paul's is fortunate to have spiritual directors available for sessions. Call the office for a referral.


#### **POWER, PRIVILEGE AND RACE**

Do you want to address racism but don't know where to begin?

Faith & Racial Equity: Exploring Power & Privilege is an eight-session program that awakens a realization of how the economic systems, public policies, cultural

norms and hidden biases empower some and oppress others.

The first half of the program lays the groundwork for understanding and identifying racial privilege. Sessions 5-8 take a deeper dive into specific issues related to power and privilege, including



affirmative action, the school-to-prison pipeline, disparities within the criminal justice system, and biases in media representation. As with all JustFaith Ministries' programs, participants will explore how their faith should inform their response to their learning, as well as discern action steps for working toward racial equity in their own communities.

This program will be offered via Zoom starting at **6:30 p.m. Tuesday, October 5,** and continuing every other week thereafter. The co-facilitators are Peter Adams and Julie Laurenzi. There is no charge.

## **CALL TO SOCIAL JUSTICE**

Author John W. Miller notes that in this era of globalization, the true cost of the convenience to which Americans have grown accustomed – an unlimited supply of goods to click now to buy – needs attention.

"...if we are to talk about a moral economy, we need to understand global trade. Specifically, if we are to look at trade through the Catholic social teaching prism of care for the dignity of every human, we need to better see each person involved in making and shipping us the stuff we wear, ride, eat and sleep on, and the connections between them and us. And we need to understand that, like all things in capitalism, trade gives us something good (a higher quality of life) at a cost (the decimation of manufacturing jobs closer to home)," says Miller.
