POWER, PRIVILEGE AND RACE

Do you want to address racism but don't know where to begin?

Faith & Racial Equity: Exploring Power & Privilege is an eightsession program that awakens a realization of how the economic systems, public policies, cultural norms and hidden biases empower some and oppress others.



The first half of the program lays the groundwork for understanding and identifying racial privilege. Sessions 5-8 take a deeper dive into specific issues related to power and privilege, including affirmative action, the school-to-prison pipeline, disparities within the criminal justice system, and biases in media representation. As with all JustFaith Ministries' programs, participants will explore how their faith should inform their response to their learning, as well as discern action steps for working toward racial equity in their own communities.

This program will be offered free of charge via ZOOM starting at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, October 5, and continuing every other week thereafter. The cofacilitators are Peter Adams and Julie Laurenzi, who have completed the program.

CALL TO SOCIAL JUSTICE

We continue to share resources into social justice issues from a Church/Biblical perspective.

This week's topic, although not strictly one of "social justice" by definition, does address a divisive issue



within the church. For many Catholics, the Holy Father's motu proprio "<u>Traditionis Custodes,</u>" restricting the celebration of the Latin Mass, was a difficult document to read, as well as a surprise, even a shock.

"While I have never

celebrated a Latin Mass as a priest (I'm using a shorthand for several variations of the Mass in Latin), I have as a Jesuit attended several," says Fr. James Martin. "I found those Masses rich and beautiful. ...Still, I feel more comfortable with Mass in the vernacular."
