## **THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS**

**Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-8** 

Moses lays before the community the statutes and decrees that will set them apart.

Psalm 15:2-3, 3-4, 4-5

The one who lives without blame and for justice will stand in God's presence.

James 1:17-18, 21b-22, 27

Pure religion is marked by defense of the poor and avoidance of worldly ways.

Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

Jesus leapfrogs a discussion on ritual observances to propose a greater standard.

FOCUS: Jesus teaches us to keep our focus on obeying God's commandments.

Like the Pharisees in today's Gospel, we can get caught up in our traditions, questioning and arguing with those who do things differently or want to change our ways. Jesus offers a reminder to not lose sight of what is truly important: Obeying God's commandments and keeping our hearts and actions pure.

#### LITURGY OF THE WORD:

Moses exhorts the Israelites to listen to and observe the commandments of the Lord. The Apostle James calls upon his fellow Christians to humbly receive and practice God's word. In the Gospel, Jesus accuses the Pharisees of observing human religious traditions yet failing to obey God's commands. He then teaches the people that it is the thoughts and actions born in the human heart that defile.
